A NEW species of fish from the days of the dinosaurs has been discovered in a cart in an Indonesian fish market. Genetic tests have revealed that the stubby-finned creature is a member of the coelacanth family, which was once thought to have died out 70 million years ago. It brings to two the number of species of coelacanths now known to have survived. Only freshwater lungfish have similarly survived almost unchanged for 400 million years. In 1938, when scientists off the Comoros Islands near South Africa discovered a "living fossil", researchers believed the relic population of coelacanths to be unique. It was thought that the fish from a bygone age had clung on in the subterranean caves around the Comoros because of special geological circumstances. But the new discovery made in the Celebes Sea near to the Indonesian island of Menado Tua indicates that "fossil fish" may be more widespread than had been supposed. Laurent Pouyaud, of the French Government's Institut de Recherche pour le Développement, said yesterday: "We have not only found a new population of coelacanths but a new species." From speaking to fishermen, who, it seems, occasionally catch the fish and sell them for food, it appears that the population around Indonesia could be large and healthy. The one in the Comoros is considered to be no bigger than 500 and highly vulnerable to overfishing and inbreeding.

Japanese dealers have been paying Como-

OUR FOUNDING FATHERS

Have you ever wondered what happened to those men who signed the Declaration of Independence?

Five signers were captured by the British as traitors and tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned. Two lost their sons in the Revolutionary Army, another had two sons captured. Nine of the fifty-six fought and died from wounds or the hardship of the Revolutionary War.

What kind of men were they? Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners, all men of means, well educated. But they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured.

They signed and they pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor.

Carter Braxton of Virginia, wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships sink from the sea by the British navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.

Thomas McKeam, was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him, and poverty was his reward.

Vandals or soldiers or both, looted the properties of Ellery, Clymer, Hal Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Ruttledge and Middleton.

At the battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson, Jr. noted that the British Gen Cornwallis, had taken over the Nelson

home for his headquarters. The owner quietly urged General George Washington to open fire, which was done. The home was destroyed, and Nelson died bankrupt. Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife, and soon after she died.

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his grist mill were laid waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home

after the war to find his wife dead, his children vanished. A few weeks later he died from exhaustion and a broken heart. Morris and Livingston suffered similar fates.

Such were the stories and sacrifices of the American Revolution. These were not wild-eyed, rabble-rousing ruffians. There were soft-spoken men means and education. They had security, but they valued liberty more.

Standing tall, straight, and unwavering, they pledged: For the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of the Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortune and our sacred honor." They gave us an Independent America. Can we keep it?

THE CLOWN ANEMONE FISH

The Clown Anemone Fish (Amphiprion percula) is one of the dozen or so species of anemone fishes living in both Atlantic and Pacific oceans. In the ocean wilds, these fish live commonly in close relationship with certain sea anemones, whose tentacles have explosive stinging cells capable of capturing and killing most fish coming in contact. Yet, the clownfish is immune to these poisonous tentacles. It lives comfortably in its own "feathery bed" of anemone tentacles without harm. To aid the anemone, the clownfish brings bits of food home to actually feed the anemone. Evolution fails to explain these examples of symbiosis - two totally separate species living together for mutual benefit. Studies have shown that the various species of anemone fishes have protective mucous coatings which prevent the anemone from discharging

its lethal stinging cells.

Both clownfish and anemone live quite well without the other. Many species live separately in the oceans today. Yet each does benefit from the other's help. (The anemone protects the clownfish and it brings food to the anemone).

They could never have evolved to this state of mutualism, since it is not necessary for their existence!



ros fishermen to hunt for coelacanths after forming the idea that a fish that has cheated extinction must hold clues to everlasting life. Spinal fluid from a coelacanth reputedly sells for thousands of pounds for a teaspoonful. Dr Pouyaud suspected that tests on Indonesian coelacanths would show that the population was bigger and more genetically diverse, making it less vulnerable. The species off the Comoros has been called Latimeria chalumnae, and the one found off Indonesia Latimeria menadoensis. It was discovered when Mark Erdmann, a marine biologist from the Uni-

versity of California, Berkeley, was on honeymoon and his wife noticed an odd-looking fish being taken to market in the town of Manado.

because their deeds were evil" (John 3:19), so Christ Himself is now the One who divides.
